Convention Tips.....

Judy Tennant has kindly put together some useful tips to Zontians attending the Convention in June. ‘First-timers’ attending will find these tips very helpful. Here are a few of those points :

- Expect to be one of approx. 1,000 women all converging on the Convention Centre at the same time each day. It will be busy around Melbourne and you will need to allow plenty of time to get from place to place within and around the Convention Centre.

- On the first Saturday of Convention, you will notice there is a ‘first timers’ briefing. It’s a good idea to attend this, since this will provide details about protocols and how voting is carried out.
- Zonta Club of Perth will elect a delegate who will sit in the delegates area to vote on the club’s behalf. The Club will decide how we want to vote on specific issues and our delegate will carry our Club vote.
- Lunches can be pre-booked at \$15 a head at Convention. If this is not enticing, there are many venues outside for lunches, but this could be difficult if a lot of people decide to do the same thing, so check with your fellow Zontians which days they are dining in or out!!
- The district meeting for our District 23 is scheduled for the Thursday of Convention (not Saturday as the programme lists). Friends of Mowanjum Open Letter # 1

News from Dr Mary Anne Jebb—Consultant Historian to Mowanjum. Mary Anne writes...

“Dear Friends,

This is the first of a series of e-mails to Friends of Mowanjum. This group is drawn from people who have expressed an interest in assisting Worrorra, Ngarinyin and Wunambal people to benefit from the production and reproduction of their cultural and artistic materials. It is likely that you will receive only occasional emails, but if you would prefer not to be part of a group posting just let me know. Conversely, if you would like to add someone to this list please feel free to pass it on, as it will remain an open letter. For the time being it is generated by me at (maryanne@allbrookjebb.com.au) as part of my role to assist Worrorra, Ngarinyin and Wunambal peoples of Mowanjum with the cultural and historical interpretation of the new Art and Culture Centre.

One of the big issues to date is the lack of historical objects and materials accessible to the community and available for display, as so many of Mowanjum's art pieces have been sold, exchanged or gifted to people and institutions outside the Kimberley. A process of restoration and repatriation of historical cultural materials is underway, greatly assisted by people like Dr Valda Blundell who has, for some years, been working on a repatriation project with Mowanjum people called 'The Family History Digital Database', Caleb Guy, who has donated valuable and important objects created by the deceased artist Jack Wherra, Rein Van Der Ruit, who has scanned his historical images and sent them to Mowanjum, Kim Akerman, Ian Crawford, Peppe Cummins, the Watts family, the Blythe family, Kim Doohan who has donated Idriess books, Paul Lane and others (who will be formally thanked in future newsletters). However, there is a continuing loss of cultural materials from the region and from the families who created them.

Boab Nut Carving Competition

Late last year MASWAC (Mowanjum Artists Spirit of the Wandjina) decided to sponsor and organise an annual boab nut carving competition to raise the profile of local carvers and to provide a means to recognize this unique and beautiful art form. It is felt that too many experienced boab nut artists continued to sell their work in an ad hoc manner, sometimes for as little as \$15 for a piece that is unique and had taken days to produce. The competition will provide a focus for artists to sell pieces of their work, and provide a means to have their talents more widely recognized. MASWAC will also buy some of the best for the community to keep for their families in their new art and culture centre. The competition will be open to everyone who hand-carves boab nuts (no electrical devices). There will be two categories - (Open) over 21 and (junior) under 21 with male and female prize winners in each of them. MASWAC is hoping to provide worthwhile cash prizes for first and second in each category, as well as paying each of the winners for their boab nuts, so that they can be displayed in the new art and culture centre boab nut carving display, and become part of the art and culture centre permanent collection. Entry will be \$2.00. The entries will be displayed and winners announced at the Mowanjum Festival on July 5th. The competition has not been officially announced - we await confirmation of prizes and judges. MASWAC has requested that there be 3 or 4 judges; Carol Martin, Mark Kraljevich (Derby TAFE Art Lecturer) Kim Akerman and the chair of the Nyigina Working Group will be the first to be asked.

We are looking for prizes for the winners. Please let me know or Mark Norval if you have any ideas or would like to contribute as a sponsor, or donate toward a cash prize or purchase. Donations can be tax deductible.

Other assistance could be useful - like helping to produce a poster or application forms. MASWAC has already contributed \$500 toward buying the winners' carvings and the Mowanjum store has also donated a \$50 store voucher for a prize. This is just the beginning.
