## 2006-2008 International Service Program Projects

### New Projects

#### **CARE International: Education and Leadership for Girls and Young Women in Bolivia**

##### **Project Focus:**

*Women's Education, Health, and Economic Self-Sufficiency*

##### **2006-2008 Funding:**

*US\$250,000*

For various cultural and economic reasons, girls in Bolivia are more likely than boys to be denied schooling. Many rural parents keep their daughters at home to care for siblings, or they send them into urban areas to seek employment.

CARE's **Education and Leadership for Girls and Young Women** project will provide working girls and young women (ages 13-25)

in around La Paz, Bolivia, opportunities to learn at night, in order to improve their status, well-being, and the opportunities available to them. The project will:

- reach 1,300 young working women and 150 teachers who teach girls in night school
- provide working girls and young women with literacy and numeracy skills and improve their chances of finding better jobs.
- include a special focus on women's health education,
- help young women develop marketable technical skills that will give them opportunities to increase their income-earning potential.

#### **United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO): Support for Revival of Rural Community-based Self-Help Initiatives in Sri Lanka**

##### **Project Focus:**

*Women's Economic Self-Sufficiency*

##### **2006-2008 Funding:**

*US\$250,000*

The tsunami disaster that occurred on 26 December 2004, affected the coastal belts in the Southern, Northern and Eastern provinces of Sri Lanka. In addition to the loss of some 40,000 lives and destruction to buildings and infrastructure, the disaster affected hundreds of micro and small businesses in rural areas.

Some 12 months later, it has become even more important to revive and re-establish the livelihood of the people, especially women, affected by the tsunami in order for the local economy to recover from the natural disaster, as well as for the communities to start longer term development of the Regions.

The project will

- improve the livelihood of the communities affected by the tsunami in the North and East regions, through improved agriculture-based productive skills and enhanced access to markets of women and women's groups.
- will work closely with the private sector, particularly small business enterprises, as well as various local support schemes and self-help initiatives.

### Continuing Projects

#### **CARE International: Mata Masu Dubara "Women on the Move," Phase II**

##### **Project Focus:**

*Women's Economic Self-Sufficiency and Health Education*

##### **2006-2008 Funding:**

*US\$300,000*

The goal of Phase II is to reduce the risk of HIV/AIDS and its

physical, social and economic consequences for at least 5,100 women and their dependent children in the Bouza district of the Tahoua Department (state) in Southern Niger by 2008.

The project will:

- Include HIV/AIDS education
- Empower women to take on new challenges facing them because of AIDS.
- help women purchase HIV-related services and care;
- build networks of Mata Masu Dubara groups;
- care and mentor HIV/AIDS orphans (74% of whom are female).

#### **AFGHAN INSTITUTE OF LEARNING (AIL): Developing Community-based Efforts to Educate Afghan Women and Girls**

##### **Project Focus:**

*Women's Education and Health*

##### **2006-2008 Funding:**

*US\$100,000*

After decades with no opportunities to learn, rural and poor urban Afghan females have begun learning literacy and income generation skills at AIL's Women's Learning Centers (WLCs) and formed their own Community Based Organizations (CBOs) for women and girls.

This project will

- provide educational classes through WLCs and CBOs for approximately 650 women and girls each year
- Support at least two CBOs to receive training and small amounts of financial support to develop their programs, improve their program quality, and sustain their grassroots efforts.
- Train at least 100 women each year
- Provide health education to 24,000 women and children each year through its clinics.

### Women walking for women



Soroptimist International Fremantle President, Marilyn Fowler, has invited us to join her in *Women Walking for Women Survivors of War - An International Sponsored Walk on Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> September 2006 at 10 am.*

(Saturday closest to International Day of Peace on 21st September).

The walk will commence from the car park at the Rottneest Ferry terminal in Beach St East Fremantle to Zepha's café park and back to the Beach St Café this approximately 5 Km's

Suggested entry fee \$5 or get work colleagues and family to sponsor you @ \$1.00 per km The walk will culminate at a coffee shop!!! Car park is 50 cents an hour.

Proceeds will go towards SI's Project Independence that will help women survivors of war in Afghanistan, Bosnia Herzegovina and Rwanda.

### Carer Services

Most people are not aware of the range of community and health services available to them until circumstances – usually unplanned, place them in the position of needing to know. At this time it is difficult to know what to do, where to start or who to call!

The Australian Government formed the **Commonwealth Carelink Centres** as a **central point of contact** for **free** information about community aged care, disability and other support services. Staff are able to explain

the range and availability of services such as home help, gardening, personal care, meals, and/ or transport which assist people to live independently at home.

One community service is the **Commonwealth Carer Respite Centre**. This program which is co located with the Carelink centres was developed to provide support to **people who are caring for a family member or friend at home who is frail aged, has dementia, or with a disability or terminal illness**.

The Centres which in East and South East Metro, and regional South West

are run by the Australian Red Cross are able to respond to a wide range of circumstances and needs by providing assistance in an emergency or on planned one-off basis for example when the carer is ill, going into hospital, not coping or just needing a break.

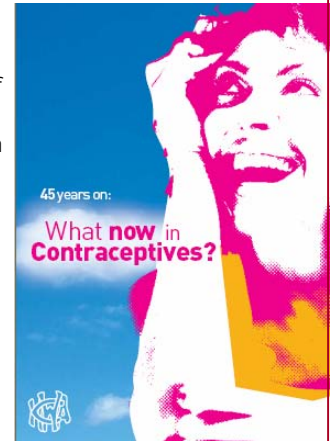

## Zonta Club of Peel Region—Missing Persons’ Memorial

A long held dream of Peel Region Zonta Club for a missing person's memorial in Mandurah has finally been realised after more than six years.

The memorial was dedicated in June at the old war memorial site on the eastern foreshore.

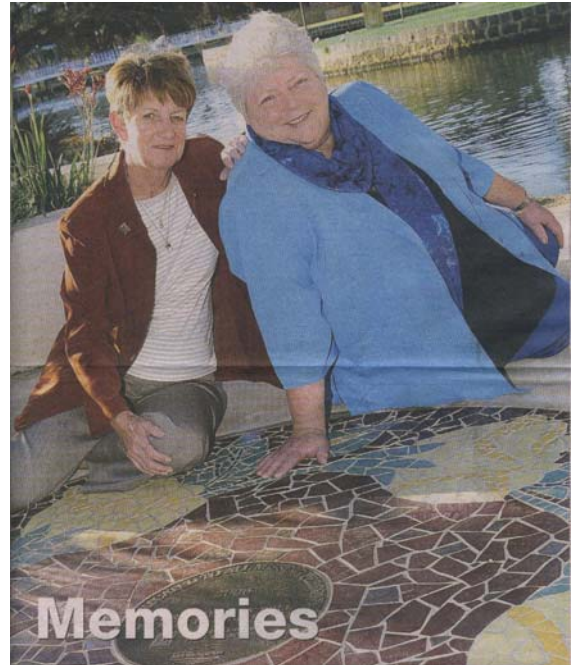
Former Zonta president Joyce O'Loughlin was at a conference in Tasmania when she heard of a similar memorial at Queenborough.

"The Peel Club had been thinking for some time of having a Zonta rose garden and the idea of combining the two appealed to me," she said.

"The family of a missing person not only has the trauma of losing a loved one, but there is the wondering what has happened to them. Normally someone has a grave to visit on special occasions, but a missing person's relatives and friends do not have that comfort. We want to provide those friends and relations with somewhere quiet and reflective where they can perhaps lay a flower and grieve for their loss."

The highlight of the memorial is a three-metre mosaic created by South Mandurah Uniting Church craft group and Zonta members. Relatives of missing people can place bronze plaques at the memorial.

Mrs O'Loughlin paid tribute to Mandurah City Council and the council workmen who took such care with the memorial.

It never ceases to amaze people that a little package consisting of a small sheet of plastic, a bar of soap, scalpel, string and disposable gloves can actually save lives!

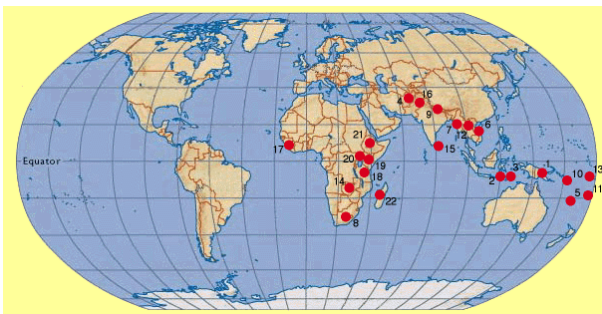
Remember that someone dies every minute somewhere in the world as a result of giving birth in a dirty environment. You can make a difference by helping to assemble the kits.
