## International Women's Day—8th March 2007

*Club members celebrated International Women's Day at a number of Perth events including a Soroptomists' Breakfast at Burswood on Swan for UNIFEM, a breakfast at the Perth Convention Centre with a keynote address by Dr Fiona Stanley, a special Lunch Box List Event at the Hyatt Hotel where our club had a display and, of course, our own club meeting.*

### IWD Lunch Box List Event —Hyatt Hotel

*Mary Gurgone was the sole club representative at the this event, but did a fantastic job of promoting our club. Carole interviewed her from Indonesia to find out what she had missed...*

*Did you enjoy the event?*

The IWD Lunchbox List Event was a most enjoyable event. It was the best attended event for IWD in WA with over 650 participants included both school and professional women. The youth focus of both the participants and speakers was fantastic to see: most IWD events attract baby boomers and older. Some indigenous young women had been flown in from the north of our State: a positive gesture by Rio Tinto.

The speakers were inspirational and included a refugee who became a lawyer and Human Rights activist, a profoundly deaf young woman as well as two mainstream young women who were all high achievers. The newly installed Minister for Women's Interests spoke in her new role for the first time and she spoke well.

*How about the display stand?*

The display stand was in the Careers Expo part of the event. Despite the fact that it was the first time that I had put up the display, it went very well indeed. Partly because I was ably assisted in the complex task of putting up the banners by the friendly neighbours from the Job Network—the banners are a feat of engineering!

The stand was very popular with masses of students and some professional women coming to ask about Zonta. The school girls were most interested in the awards and the international components of our activities. We may get a new member as one of the professional women wants to be invited to our next new members' event. Many other professional women came to ask about Zonta and took away our brochure.

*Who did you talk to?*

The students were fascinated with the Birthing Kits and the Indigenous programs.

One of the business women I met was from a corporate body that gives money to different voluntary organisations each month and would like us to provide information so that they may consider us for that purpose! Have we ever had an offer like that from a stranger?

Another most fascinating young woman from the ANZ is interested in contributing to the community while she takes some time off work and would like to know more about us.

The Indigenous girls from the north were quiet but most interested in hearing of the Indigenous programs we run.

*What was the mini careers expo like?* UWA, Murdoch and the Employment Network were in the same area that I was. Curtin Uni was in the next bay and I noticed that most girls were carrying the Curtin Uni bags and picking up information from the other Universities.

The Employment Network seemed to gather the largest crowd of girls wanting to have a chat. The two women at that stand were run off their feet.

Interestingly the Office for Women's Policy publications (many of which I had a key role in developing) went like hot cakes so that they ran out completely. So who said that young women are not interested in women's issues?

*Would you do it again?*

I believe that it was worthwhile for the Club to get exposure and possible new members. The information about the option for getting sponsorship support and good contacts were a bonus beyond the expected marketing opportunity for Zonta.

*What information may help for next year?*

I think it would attract more girls if we had the actual application forms for the Education Awards. It would be good to have the information for the Indigenous young women, including a flyer about the mentoring scheme. It's rare that we have access to so many young Indigenous women from our north.

I'm not sure if it's appropriate to print of some forms about Zonta's next information evening, but that would attract the young professional women.

### UNIFEM Breakfast —Burswood on Swan

The Soroptomist International UNIFEM Breakfast was officially opened by Barbara Etter, Assistant Commissioner, WA Police. The guest speaker was Allison Whitelaw who was nominated for Young Western Australian 2006.

Proceeds from the breakfast went to UNIFEM to support a major UNIFEM Pacific project to assist members of regional networks and other selected organisations in their work to End Violence Against Women.

The project will offer leadership training, and build the capacity of women's organisations across all Pacific nations to initiate, design and conduct projects and strategies through the UN Trust Fund to Eliminate Violence Against Women. The project will involve focused training for NGO leaders in an extended regional workshop in mid 2007, with mentoring and practical on the ground project support.

UNIFEM Australia will also continue to contribute to the global UN Trust Fund to end Violence Against Women.

The Trust Fund became operational 10 years ago and has so far awarded some \$13 million to 226 initiatives in more than 100 countries.

Recently the Government of Spain pledged Euro 3 million (\$3.9 million) to the United Nations Trust Fund to End Violence against Women. It is the largest contribution ever made to the UNIFEM-managed Trust Fund since its establishment through the UN General Assembly in 1996.

Besides the Government of Spain, recent donors to the Trust Fund have included: the Governments of Austria, Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Ireland, Norway, Slovenia, Spain, Trinidad and Tobago, USA; UNIFEM National Committees; NGOs such as **Zonta International**; and the private sector: Johnson & Johnson, Macy's, Omega, TAG Heuer. ## New women's consultative body announced

Women's Interests Minister Sue Ellery has announced the establishment of a 14-member peak consultative network to better represent the views and interests of Western Australian women in State policy and decision-making.

Ms Ellery, already well-known for her energy and strong commitment to social justice and human rights, said the new Women's Advisory Network of WA (WANWA) would be set up through the Office for Women's Policy (OWP) as part of an overarching community engagement framework, to involve and encourage all women in raising their status and value in this State.

"The status of women in WA is a real mixed bag," the Minister said.

"We have had some wins, but they are never quite enough and we are constantly needing to push harder: it is a typical two steps forward, one step back scenario."

Ms Ellery said the current statistics for women in WA reflected that:

- they still only earned 75 per cent of men's average weekly earnings;
- more than half (59.4 per cent) were in the labour force;
- they represented 23.9 per cent of senior executive service positions in the public sector, 29 per cent of local government councillors, 30 per cent of board and committee members and 35 per cent of union delegates;
- 11.5 per cent of all apprenticeships and 49.4 per cent of all traineeships were female;
- participation rates for women in senior positions in public authorities ranged from 2.8 per cent in tier one local government management to 35.6 per cent in tier three university management;
- 34.7 per cent of WA small business owners were women;
- 77.5 per cent of girls completed Year 12 at school; and although Australia had the highest rate in history of female participation in the labour market, employment standards for women were rapidly slipping under the new Work Choices regime.

"WANWA has been set up with a clear purpose to improve the status of women in WA through sound strategic policy advice and to represent the perspectives of key peak non-Government organisations in the area of women's interests," the Minister said.

"In addition to WANWA, other key elements of OWP's new community engagement framework include planning for a Women's Summit, Indigenous Women's Congress, State Indigenous Women's Gathering and Regional Women's Forums.

"The network members will largely be representatives of peak women's groups and community which can encompass and contribute the broader views and concerns of women across the State."

Ms Ellery said prospective candidates needed to have previous experience in developing policy or providing services relevant to WA women and, most importantly, have a good grasp and understanding of contemporary women's issues.

"There is a huge diversity of women which needs to be encompassed through WANWA," she said.

"This includes young women, women with disabilities, indigenous women, lesbian women, women on low incomes, women from culturally and linguistically diverse communities, women living in rural, regional and remote areas and women working within predominantly male environments."

Calls for nominations will be widely advertised through State and metropolitan community newspapers during the next month and promoted through OWP's website and mail-outs to peak community groups and not-for-profit organisations associated with women's interests.

Costs have risen dramatically and are now \$2.40 a kit. The price rises have been caused by Australia Post discontinuing economy air and materials cost increases. Therefore, clubs are now being asked to contribute \$800 for 1000 kits with AusAID donating \$1600 to achieve the total of \$2400 for 1,000 kits.
