1. Holly Ransom – Inspirational Winner of the District 23 2010 Jane M Klausman Women in Business Scholarship

The selection process has been completed and I am happy to announce the results. There were 3 nominations received again this year – thank you to the Zonta Club of Bendigo, Area 3 and Area 5 through the Zonta Club of Queenborough for supporting this award.

Holly Ransom, the Area 3 nomination, has been selected as this year's District 23 winner of the Jane M Klausman Women in Business Scholarship. She is currently studying in the third year of a Degree in Arts/Law, majoring in Economics, at the University of WA. Her special subject areas of interest are management, economics and public policy. She has excelled during her tertiary studies, this year being selected to represent UWA at the World Universities Network Enterprises International Student Forum and last year being awarded scholarships to attend the Centre for Independent Studies "Liberty and Society" Conference in Sydney and the History of Economic Thought Association Conference.

Holly stated that she aims "to be an example of the exceptional contribution that women can bring to the decision-making table, and therefore, inspire young girls to be active contributors to social (and economic) reform and to political debates more generally." Her immediate goal is "to advance my studies to the highest level possible to provide myself with the best leverage with which to achieve my social aims." Holly's ultimate aim is to help others who are less fortunate and to provide a voice for those unable to be heard in the public arena. She is undecided whether this will take her into social entrepreneurship, economic and development policy work or not-for-profit management. She does know that she wants to have an impact on governments having a greater understanding of economic policy in development and on corporate organizations having a heightened social conscience in business.

Holly's volunteer and community work is nothing short of amazing – her involvement is at the highest level – as a peer tutor in the Sir Charles Court Young Leaders' Program; a mentor to first year university students at UWA; a member of the Red Cross Youth Advisory Council of WA; the community liaison officer with SIFE (Students in Free Enterprise) UWA, which is an international social entrepreneurship competition in universities in 48 countries; the Director of Young UNIFEM Perth; the executive assistant of Left Right Think Tank (WA), an organization to develop involvement of young people in public policy and debate; the founder and Director of the Women Who Lead Initiative, an organization to foster mentorship for young women with women in leadership positions and an intern with Inspire Foundation (WA), an organization seeking to establish a Youth Engagement Strategy in the West Australian context.

5. Catherine's Gift – Book Review

Inside the world of Dr Catherine Hamlin by John Little. (2008, Pan books)

The whole topic of obstetric fistula can be quite confronting – confronting enough for people not to want to read about it! However this book focuses on the people not the condition and it was a book that I found hard to put down.

The author had written previous books about Dr Catherine Hamlin and this was a follow up. I hadn't read the previous books, but that didn't matter. I liked this book as it followed people on their journeys:

- the injured women on their journey to the hospital (which in some cases takes women years to save the bus fare);
- the doctors from around the world who are touched by the difference that fistula operations make to people's lives and who seek out the hospital for training;
- the treated women who continue to work at the hospital as nursing aides and, of course,
- Dr Hamlin's journey that has inspired everyone to lend a hand!

Dr Hamlin is in her eighties and continues to operate, administrate and contribute to the physical, emotional and social wellbeing of so many. Whilst I felt I already had an understanding of the medical condition, this book helped me understand the cultural context in an easy to read way.

I am so proud that through the support of the Zonta International Foundation, we are all part of the story, as part of the funds we raise go towards the ZI service projects that include helping to reduce obstetric fistula. In addition, I was doubly proud to learn that Dr Catherine Hamlin was made a Zonta International Honorary Member in 1996!


I strongly urge all Zontians to learn more about Dr Catherine Hamlin either through this book or the many others that have been written about her.


